Rules of Capitalization

We use capital letters for:

- 1. The beginning of every sentence
- 2. The pronoun "I"
- 3. Names of specific people, places, organizations, gods
- 4. Nationalities, cultures, languages
- 5. Months and days of the week
- 6. The Christian, Jewish, of Muslim "God" (and Jesus Christ)
- 7. Titles -- a) of books, plays, reports, articles, etc.
 - b) of professions when addressing a person: Dr. Jones, Officer Smith

We do **NOT** use capital letters to emphasize or give importance to words!

We do **NOT** use capital letters for general nouns: truth, not Truth beauty, not Beauty biology, not Biology
