These degrees prepare the baccalaureate-degree nurse to become certified as a nurse practitioner in Adult, Family or Geriatric primary care. Graduates are eligible for New York State certification and are prepared to sit for national certification exams. Registered nurses with non-nursing baccalaureate degrees may be able to qualify for entrance to the graduate program by validation of knowledge through required tests. The programs are approved by the New York State Education Department and fully accredited by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE).

### **M.S. in Nurse Educator • Advanced Certificate Nurse Educator (both offered in blended format)**

The M.S. in Nurse Educator Program is a 36-credit program presented in a blended onlinelearning format that provides the baccalaureate graduate with a strong foundation in the knowledge and skills needed for a position in academic teaching or staff development: curriculum development, theories of teaching and learning, teaching methodologies, use of stimulation and testing and outcomes measurements.”

## Student Health Insurance

Starting with the 2010-11 academic year, Long Island University has partnered with Aetna Student Health to develop a benefit plan that provides our students with more robust medical coverage at school, back home and while traveling or studying abroad. This new plan offers students and their dependents access to Aetna's nationwide network of doctors, hospitals and pharmacies throughout the country; benefit maximums of \$50,000 per condition per policy year; no annual deductibles; and coverage for pre-existing conditions.

Plan enhancements include:

- annual routine physical exams
- expanded coverage for State-mandated vaccinations, prescription drugs, emergency room, laboratory, surgical and x-ray expenses
- travel assistance services with world-wide medical coverage while traveling or studying abroad.

The Aetna plan is available to any and all students enrolled and registered in degree-granting programs at Long Island University. Students participating in programs at the Campus that require foreign travel are mandated to enroll in the plan, even if they have comparable coverage. All international students, clinical students, residential students and intercollegiate athletes are automatically enrolled in the plan but can waive participation online if they have comparable coverage under a family plan or other policy. All remaining students are not automatically enrolled, but are eligible to purchase the same plan on a voluntary basis for the entire policy year. Students who enter during the spring and summer terms also can participate in the plan with shorter coverage periods, reduced rates and specific enrollment/waiver deadlines. ### My LIU

My LIU is the University's student portal that provides access to several enrollment services offices. After your initial course registration you will be able to activate your account, you will be able to check your bill, review your course registration and access email and academic resources such as the Blackboard System.

Keep in mind, that as an enrolled continuing student most of the business/communication you will conduct with the University will be done through My LIU.

Through the University's My LIU portal, you can execute the following financial services-related actions:

- View your current account balance and billing history
- Pay your bill by credit card or by check
- Set up an authorized user account so that a relative, a guardian, or an employer can pay an outstanding balance on your behalf
- View your payment history and all refunds that have been processed
- View bursar-related holds on your account
- Waive compulsory health insurance
- View your financial aid information
- View a list of "to do" items, that reflects documents that need to be submitted and actions that need to be taken to ensure your enrollment or continued enrollment

## Library

The Brooklyn Campus Library is located on the 3rd floor of the Salena Library Learning Center. The Library has over 100 research and Internet computer terminals and contains a collection of over 265,000 books, 1,400 varied titles, 8,700 videos, 32,000 e-books and access to frequently used databases. Additionally, students have access to the University's 2.6-million-volume, multicampus library system.

The Library is a member of the Academic Libraries of Brooklyn, so you can extend your borrowing privileges to other member institutions, such as Brooklyn College, New York City College of Technology, NYU-Polytechnic, Pratt Institute, St. Francis College and St. Joseph's College.
